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### **Gemma Rolls-Bentley: Llenando los vacíos en la historia del arte con arte queer**

Gemma Rolls-Bentley todavía recuerda la primera vez que vio el trabajo de un artista queer. Tenía unos veinte años y acababa de mudarse a Londres cuando vio una exposición de {img}grafías en blanco y negro de Catherine Opie en la galería Stephen Friedman. Después de obtener dos títulos en historia del arte, nunca había sido contextualizado como queer.

"Entonces vi todas estas {img}s de lesbianas en bicicletas y papás de cuero - en una galería de alto nivel, en Mayfair!" ella recuerda. "Fue algo que nunca había visto aprobado o validado de esa manera. Fue como: son mi gente y están colgadas en una galería!"

La encargada de contenido de The Guardian, Chloe Hamilton, entrevistó a Rolls-Bentley sobre su nueva misión: crear un libro que llene los vacíos en la historia del arte con artistas queer. El libro, titulado "Queer Art: From Canvas to Club and the Spaces Between", presenta breves biografías de casi 200 artistas queer activos entre la década de 1960 y la actualidad.

### **Una historia queer inclusiva**

Garantizar una perspectiva integral e inclusiva fue clave para el proyecto. Rolls-Bentley adoptó un proceso de investigación exhaustivo para garantizar que "no se dejara piedra sin remover". También trabajó con galerías, museos y asistentes de investigación, y buscó en archivos de exposiciones de arte queer que datan de la década de 1970.

**"El relato de la historia del arte queer que hemos tenido ha tendido a centrarse en versiones cis, blancas, gay y masculinas de la homosexualidad"**, dice Rolls-Bentley. "Sentí que era extremadamente importante que más de la mitad de los artistas en el libro no fueran cis ni blancos. Realmente quería comunicar que la experiencia queer y trans es multifacética; no hay una versión de lo que eso se ve."

### **¿Qué constituye el "arte queer"?**

Definir lo que constituye el "arte queer" también fue un desafío. ¿Es todo el arte hecho por personas queer? ¿Tiene que representar explícitamente temas LGBTQ+?

"No creo que esas sean preguntas fáciles de responder. Hay algunos ejemplos en el libro de arte creado por personas que no se identifican como LGBTQIA+, pero se sintieron como partes importantes de esta historia, así que los incluí", dice, señalando la serie de {img}grafías de drag queens de Harlem House Ballroom de Chantal Regnault de 1989 a 1992.

**"Para mí, el arte queer es el arte que refleja la experiencia queer de alguna manera u otra".**

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
